### Greetings everyone from your President!

#### Where are the birds?

Activity around my bird feeders seems less than previous winters. The resident Cardinals, Carolina Chickadees, Ruby-crowned Kinglet, Blue Jays and Titmice are around. A blight of House Sparrows is a new visitor. But where are the House Finches, Downy Woodpeckers and American Goldfinches?

We look forward to observing the Goldfinches each winter. But their numbers at the feeder vary each year. One year we counted over 40 Goldfinches around the feeder at one time. Other years we only see two or three at a time. So far this year we've been shut out.

It's not just our back yard, the most recent U. S. Fish & Wildlife Service Whooping Crane Update reports the two marked Whooping Cranes that used the Granger Lake area last year have both been hanging out around the Aransas Refuge most recently. So, we will enjoy the birds that are visiting our feeders and hope others may show up next year.

Thanks to all the participants in the CBC on Saturday, December 14. It was a cold day but we had a good time. Tom's initial report is elsewhere in this newsletter and I look forward to hearing his CBC report at the meeting.

### **BIRDS SEEN AND HEARD**

Here is Tom Robbins' report on the 2013 CBC! It appears that we had 109 spp. of birds counted. We had 22 participants including Bill Wright of Houston and Chuck Smith of Austin. Here is the list of species found:

An additional 5 species were reported during the official count week: Common Loon, Short-eared Owl, Canyon Wren, Blue-headed Vireo, and Lesser Goldfinch.

Correction: The December Newsletter stated that a Thayer's Gull, reported by Gil Eckrich was a county first. This was in error – Randy Pinkston discovered a 1<sup>st</sup>-cycle Thayer's Gull at Temple Lake Park 10 years earlier, on 28 October 2003.

And, Randy has struck again! On 29 December he found a Couch's Kingbird on Hickory Road in Temple.
